Cynthesis: Why YOU should join a Chalice Circle this Fall

“Chalice Circles” is our new name for Covenant Groups. This will be our fourth round of Covenant Groups at UUCL; more than a hundred current members and friends have enjoyed these groups and deepened friendships while learning, serving, and supporting one another. The new round of Chalice Circles will begin in the fall. Facilitators (we still need a few more... if you think you are qualified, contact Cynthia asap) will be training in August, and sign-ups will take place by early September.

What’s new and different? This time, Chalice Circles will offer themed discussions. A few examples of possible themes: prayer & spiritual practice; social justice & service; history of our faith; LGBT issues; family systems; parenting as a UU... the ideas are limited only by the imagination of the facilitator. YOU will have the opportunity to choose from either a specific theme OR a day/time that suit you.

Our community consists of 311 *members* and well over 100 frequent participants. The question that arises as we move from our recently adopted Vision statement to specific ideas about mission and goals is: *How well do we care for one another?* Our hope, as staff (and leadership), is that we can utilize the Chalice Circles to improve our caring community. In the past, this has happened in numerous instances, but we would like to make it a bit more systematic. That said, Chalice Circles are **not** therapy groups and individuals **will** be discouraged from inappropriate use of the group’s time. The idea is that we deepen relationships during the group time and allow then for more one-to-one care giving outside the group when the need arises. So, we urge you to join a Chalice Circle! You are giving, at most, two hours per month of your time to participate more fully and meaningfully in the UUCL community. If you don’t participate in creating community, it is hardly fair to complain that something is lacking! **Think you don’t need such a group? Consider this: maybe a chalice circle needs you!**

Music Notes

Report from the Unitarian Universalist Musician's Network

"If we cannot connect emotionally, then all is lost. This is the job of the singer." ~ Dr. Stephen Altop, conductor of UUMN Choir July 2010



Imagine a room with 300 people and every time you look around, you remind yourself of two things: 1) Everyone in the room is a musician and 2) Everyone in the room is a Unitarian. Then let the grin spread across your face as wide as you want!

That was my constant feeling at the UU Musician's Network Conference this past July 13-18. Each morning started with a service of mediation, music and readings. This was followed by a two hour choir rehearsal with over 200 singers, then workshops, noon time recitals, more workshops, dinner and a special ethno-musicologist presenter.

As a choir participant, we sang a Bach setting of *Dona Nobis Pacem*, a Finnish arrangement of *Deep River*, a commissioned work for the UUMN by Stephen Paulus, and a John Rutter arrangement of *Down By the Riverside*. While the experience was terrific, and it was very good to review numerous technical singing issues and observe a powerful conductor at work, I took time to focus on the direction of the music program at UUCL.

In *UU World* magazine, there is much written about making sure we are not a stagnant organization and that we are open and welcoming to people of all cultures. I see music as the avenue for this opening to occur. This does not mean we UU musicians must stop doing Bach or Telemann or Brahms. But it *does* mean we need to augment our repertoire to include music from around the world. It is our job as music leaders to make this music accessible to our congregations.

My gut feelings during my first year as your Music Director were already headed down this road. The conference confirmed my views that this is not only a true itinerary for us as an international church, but also for our beloved UUCL. At UUCL, we have such an open minded congregation where music is concerned and we will fill the cup with music of great variety this year.

This kind of musical expansion can take place in simple ways such as a Singing Meditation Practice or in singing folk songs from around the world in our

services. It can happen in transformative ways by connecting with each other musically as we do a musical exchange with local churches, not just UU churches. If it is true that Sunday is the most segregated day of the week, let's sing together to break that boundary, let's meet in music to say with our songs what we cannot always say with words alone.
